Mr. Paul Laskey BJC 6th Dan was appointed Chief Examiner of the British Judo Council at Bognor Summer School 27th August 2010.

The Role of the BJC Chief Examiner

This appointment is made by the President.

The role of Chief Examiner has an ongoing day to day operational function that has to be fulfilled.

The Overall Responsibilities:

The Chief Examiner is responsible to the President to ensure all BJC assessments, examinations and qualifications, are conducted fairly and in accordance with the established laid down procedures or requirements as approved by the BJC National Technical Committee.

Therefore all documentation, assessments, examinations and awards, must be to the Chief Examiner's satisfaction, this includes the functions of: Grading, Coaching, Refereeing, Kata, Technical Merit and indeed all BJC technical qualifications.

Whilst in principle all final technical decisions will remain with the President, the President will always followed the advice given by the Chief Examiner and at this time, cannot conceive circumstances where such advice would not be accepted.

Current Duties:

- 1. The Chief Examiner may wish to investigate any areas of concern.
- 2. Any dan grade recommendation for promotion that does not fulfill the requirements laid down in procedure W.I. 01, will be referred to the Chief Examiner.
- 3. Any other grading or award that does not fulfill the laid down requirements will be referred to the Chief Examiner.
- 4. From the date of appointment, the Chief Examiner, when in attendance, will sign for dan grading in the licence, on the top line, of the column 'Examiner & Authorisation', after the President has signed or so authorised the grade. This may also be done at a subsequent date or occasion.
- 5. In all other grading matters where there are 'grey areas' the Chief Examiner will give his advice i.e. exceptional non-contest grades, honorary grades, special needs grades, etc.
